

# Fisheries Improvement Programme 2023

## Guidance for applicants

December 2022

Over the 2-year period April 2021 to March 2023 the Environment Agency will have reinvested about £2.5M in projects to support clubs, fisheries and other partners to improve local fish stocks and angling opportunities.

The Fisheries Improvement Programme (FIP) is funded from the coarse, trout and eel fishing licence income and provides a direct benefit to anglers.

We are initially making £500k available to support projects, a proportion of these will be identified and delivered by partners. This note is aimed at guiding you through the initial submission of ideas via the Angling Trust portal: <https://grants.anglingtrust.net/>.

## Who can apply?

We welcome project proposals from angling clubs, fisheries, NGOs (such as Rivers Trusts and the Wild Trout Trust), local authorities or other community organisations involved in angling.

To be eligible, the projects must be in England and involve a form of angling covered by a valid Environment Agency non-migratory trout and coarse fishing licence. Projects only benefiting salmon or sea trout, and sea angling projects cannot apply.

We welcome proposals from river, canal and stillwater fisheries. If you do not own or manage a water, you may still apply, but should obtain in advance the permission of the organisation who leases the venue.

We particularly encourage proposals from small angling clubs with limited finances; usually run by volunteers and with smaller needs. Our involvement could make a real difference for the survival of these clubs and a limited investment could result in the turnaround in their fortunes and an increase in membership.

It is not necessary to be an Angling Trust member club or affiliated organisation to apply.

## What can you apply for?

To be considered a project must provide angling benefits. The water where the project is planned must be fished. We would also expect the fishery to be open membership or day ticket so that the maximum number of licence holders benefit. There are 3 criteria we will fund

**1) Coarse, trout and eel habitat/passage:** these are the key constraints for good fish populations, addressing them will result in more sustainable stocks and improved connectivity.

**2) Angling access and facilities:** platforms, pegs and pathways for rivers and stillwaters. Ensuring the needs of less able-bodied anglers are considered.

We know that 70% of our licence holders preferentially fish stillwaters; therefore, proposals are welcomed from angling clubs and other local partners to create or improve community and urban-based fisheries (which may require both habitat and access work).

**3) Proactive management of prolonged dry weather and/or climate impacts.** This may involve supporting fishery owners with supplementary aerators/WQ meters. Where possible work should contribute to carbon Net Zero targets.

Projects should also consider socio/economic and wellbeing benefits: evidence and examples are contained within [National Angling Strategy](#). Covid-19 has increased the awareness that our sport can provide significant physical and mental health benefits for participants of all ages and abilities

We will not pay for new or replacement fish stocks.

Please be aware too that we also reinvest licence income to deliver the [Angling Improvement Fund](#), again administered on our behalf by the Angling Trust. The focus is on predation management action (mainly otters and cormorants) and biosecurity. The 2023 fund will be open for these themes in the Spring so keep an eye on the website for when applications will be invited from clubs and fisheries. Also the [Get Fishing Fund](#) which we also fund is currently open (until 5th March 2023), you should head there if you are planning angling participation events and could use some financial support.

## How much funding can I apply for?

Initially we have up to £500k available in 2023 and our intention is to allocate this money for projects to commence in April. If fishing licence sales go well, we expect to release additional funds later in the year and will invite further project ideas to be submitted at this time.

We split the amount available in each [Environment Agency Area](#) based on the level of coarse and trout fishing interests.

Most individual projects receive less than £5k each and we expect all to provide evidence of match funding: applicants should contribute additional funds, secure grants/contribution from other sources, and offer 'in-kind' support.

We would expect commercial partners to provide more actual cash funding than charities or volunteer groups/clubs.

Our aim is for every £1 of fishing licence money we invest in projects to secure £2 of match funding.

The value of volunteers can be calculated using the following rates:

We encourage you to identify and work with other partners and stakeholders. For example, if you are leasing a fishery you will need to involve the landowner. Working on rivers may benefit from working with your local Rivers Trust or the Wild Trout Trust. In an urban setting there may be a good reason to contact your local authority or other community groups. As well as being able to provide advice these partners could contribute funding.

It is often the case that with a little investment and providing appropriate advice/training that a proactive club or fishery can take on more responsibility. There are good examples of water quality monitoring, making and deploying floating islands and having a tool bank to enable owners to cut weed and undertake bankside tree and vegetation management.

We cannot pay for work already completed or pay for materials/services already purchased.

We will be unable to fund everything, and therefore applicants should be realistic in their expectations- we will review all ideas and seek to progress the best ones; working with partners to secure funds, permits through to implementation. If we are unable to financially support your idea, we may still be able to provide advice on the issue you are facing or seek to involve others to try and resolve.

## Key Dates

Date	What is required
<b>(1) 19 December 2022</b>	Project on-line portal hosted by the Angling Trust opens: <a href="https://grants.anglingtrust.net/">https://grants.anglingtrust.net/</a> .  External partners are encouraged to provide potential project ideas.  When a proposal has been completed and submitted it will be checked that all fields have been correctly entered. Applicants will either be contacted to clarify information or receive a confirmation.
<b>(2) 5 March 2023</b>	Portal closes and projects proposals are forwarded to the Environment Agency for review.
<b>(3) 31 March 2023</b>	Project review complete.
<b>(4) April 2023</b>	Commence delivery of 23/24 Fisheries Improvement Programme projects.  Successful applicants contacted by Area officers to agree project arrangements.  Unsuccessful applicants informed  There may also be good projects that cannot be progressed because there is insufficient funding at this stage (applicants have the option these being held until more budget becomes available- they would be compared and prioritised against new projects at this time).  There may also be projects which require changes or additional detail (applicants will be invited to reapply when the portal reopens).
<b>(5) June-August 2023</b>	The portal may reopen if income from rod licence sales allows
<b>(6) September 2023</b>	Repeat steps (1)-(4)
<b>(7) March 2024</b>	Complete all FIP projects and ensure payments are made in full.

## How to proceed

Therefore, if you have any ideas we need to know about these soon!

Complete the online application form. Answer all the questions as this will enable us to assess your project, we are looking to fund works where there is a good understanding of the need and benefits. We also need to be confident that the work required can be safely delivered on budget and to time.

Projects will be reviewed and funded using the following assessment criteria:

- The size of your club/number of angler visits
- Justification of the need and design details
- A robust project delivery plan
- An accurate budget that shows match funding offered

We may ask to see copies of:

- The organisation's most recent audited accounts, recent bank statements, or equivalent
- Evidence of prices or copies of quotations
- Confirmation of partnership funding, or offers/promises of funding
- A copy of the lease agreement for the site where the project will take place (if applicable)
- Confirmation that Public Liability Insurance cover is in place

The following is a selection of permissions or consents that you may need to obtain:

- Utility/Services search
- Land registry search (if required)
- Planning Permission. The Local Authority should always be consulted on construction projects. This will have cost and timescale implications and may require supporting information such as ecological surveys, archaeology interest and a formal flood risk assessment
- [Flood Risk Environmental Permit](#)

Organisations you may need to consult, depending on the nature of the project:

- Landowner consultation. Also if entry or access over land is required
- Natural England - works in a designated conservation area are likely to need formal assent
- Historic England
- Forestry Commission
- Other local interest groups

All communication will be with the main contact person as detailed on the form, by email or by phone. It is expected that a decision will be made within 4 weeks of the submission deadlines. All applicants will be contacted and advised of the outcome.

Successful applicants will be required to sign a project agreement and accept our Terms and Conditions (T&C's) governing the delivery of the project. In some circumstances, offers may be made of less than the amount applied for. Payments will be made directly to the organisations bank account, not to individuals.

Before commencing your project, you should consider your responsibilities under the Construction (Design and Management) Regulations 2015 (CDM 2015) and the Health & Safety at Work Act 1974. Appointing a contractor to do the work does not mean that you do not have responsibilities. A [free leaflet](#) can be downloaded from the HSE website

To comply with insurance requirements, it is normally expected that you must carry out a risk assessment, to consider the safety of your members and the public. This should be completed by a person with the appropriate skills, knowledge, experience, and training.

A good reference for Health and Safety advice is a recent [virtual forum](#) presentation and accompanying notes on the subject.

On completion of a successful project, we expect the work to be promoted either through a traditional press release or using social media channels. We want to spread the word about good news angling stories and how we reinvest licence income to support clubs and fisheries.

If you have taken time to submit a project proposal we will read each and every one and consider how best to take forward the work. We realise that anglers are passionate about their sport and we want to support you and together we can make fisheries better for all.

If licence sales remain strong then we plan to make more money available for FIP projects later in 2023 and we plan to repeat this offer in future years.
